Our Winter season offers an expansive new novel; a moving memoir about literary aspirations and personal growth; a poetry collection that fractures reality into kaleidoscopic visions; and the winning entry from the 2020 3-Day Novel Contest, the world's most infamous literary marathon.

From recent ReLit award-winning author Michael Blouin, *I Am Billy the Kid* proffers a revisionist telling of the life (and death?) of William H. Bonney, AKA Billy the Kid. Maybe history got it all wrong, maybe The Kid didn't die at the hand of lawman Pat Garrett after all. In fact, maybe he was rescued by a fearless and determined young woman with a plan of exacting her own revenge.

Queasy, a new memoir from Madeline Sonik, the award-winning author of *Afflictions & Departures* (Finalist for the Charles Taylor Prize) who turns her multifaceted lens on her time in the turbulent United Kingdom of the 1970s. With the backdrop of trade union strikes, mass unemployment, IRA violence, and crippling taxes, we witness the wanna-be writer's struggle to become.

And the winner of the 43rd Annual 3-Day Novel Writing Contest, *Unrest* by Emma Côté of Cochrane, Ontario. Mylène Andrews is a mortician with an aversion to black and a caustic sense of humour who sets out in her hearse to view the graveyards her estranged mother visited before her death. *Unrest* is both a road trip story and a touching eulogy on life, death, and what we leave behind.

And a new volume of poetry from eco-science poet and interdisciplinary scholar, Mari-Lou Rowley. *Catastrophe Theories* explores our increasingly unstable, surreal, and catastrophic world. While these poems capture the zeitgeist of our times, they also illuminate the small, everyday moments of truth and joy.

I AM BILLY THE KID (A NOVEL)

What if Billy the Kid not only didn't die, but was saved by a woman?


History tells us that the short and violent life of William Bonney, better known as Billy the Kid, ended at the hand of Pat Garrett on the moonless night of July 14, 1881. But *I Am Billy the Kid* tells a different story, straight from Billy himself. This revisionist history seen through the lens of a twenty-first century sensibility features the picaresque hero we thought we knew and the unexpected one that we don't; a fearless and determined young woman who is in no mood to be saved and would much prefer exacting her own revenge.

Billy has been in an alcoholic haze since a failed attempt to escape notoriety by faking his own death. By 1915, his fame has only increased, and when word of a possible ruse leaks out, Billy finds himself once again on the run. He agrees to follow his elder brother Joseph north from New Mexico Territory, to possible sanctuary in Canada. Billy and Joseph encounter Turner Wing, a young woman with a fierce sense of self-determination and the skills with a gun to back it up, and her father, a man with a past and a burlap sack over his head due to a significant facial disfiguration. They are in desperate search of Turner's sister, who has been abducted by a pair of marauding thieves. Billy and Joseph know the truth about the girl's fate and, following their own code of honour, form an uneasy alliance with the Wings to avenge her death.

The award-winning author of *Afflictions & Departures* turns her multifaceted lens on England in the 1970s in *Queasy*, a series of linked memoirs. While still grieving her father's death and the end of her first romantic relationship, Madeline Sonik moved with her mother from Windsor, Ontario to the seaside village of Ilfracombe in North Devon, England.

As a teen at war with herself, nothing could have prepared her for the incredible cultural differences that she would encounter, nor the social and political tumult that was England at the time — trade union strikes, mass unemployment, IRA violence, and crippling taxes.


Waiting tables and working as a chambermaid at local hotels, she talked politics amongst friends and work mates, with hot cups of tea throughout the day and pints of lager in the evening. Margaret Thatcher — the "Iron Lady" — loomed large as opposition leader and was fast gaining popularity, even with segments of the working class. The country seemed poised on the cusp of change and a new direction.

It was in this unlikely crucible of hope and despair, of promise and discord where the author found the sustenance to fuel her development as a person and as a writer.

Madeline Sonik is an award-winning and eclectic writer, anthologist, and teacher, who lives in Victoria, British Columbia. Her books include a novel, Arms; short fiction, Drying the Bones; a children's novel, Belinda and the Dustbunnys; two poetry collections, Stone Sightings and The Book of Changes. Her volume of personal essays, Afflictions & Departures, was nominated for the BC National Award for Canadian Non-Fiction, was a finalist for the Charles Taylor Prize, and won the 2012 City of Victoria Butler Book Prize. UNREST

Mortician Mylène Andrews spends her days dealing with death, but has never quite figured out how to live. After her estranged mother passes away, adult-orphaned Mylène sets out in her hearse to see the graveyards her mother visited before her death, guided by a collection of unsent postcards and the residual wake of a tragedy long-considered buried.

With an aversion to black, a colourful vintage wardrobe, and a caustic sense of humour, Mylène has always subverted expectations of how a funeral director should be. Over the course of her trip this helps her become an unlikely media sensation, as she encounters a smattering of strange characters and settings, including intrepid reporters, pesky rodents, and burial sites requiring scuba gear.

Brisk, observational, and darkly comic, *Unrest* is both a road trip story and a touching eulogy on life, death, and what we leave behind.





by Mari-Lou Rowley








THE ACID ROOM: THE PSYCHEDELIC TRIALS AND TRIBULATIONS OF HOLLYWOOD HOSPITAL

WHITE LIE by Clint Burnham

Part travelogue, part autofiction, part record of living under Western regimes that torture, kidnap, and murder its own citizens and those who wish to cross its borders, *White Lie* is a collection of super-short fictions. 
Just Like a Real Person is a story about broken cars and broken people. A story of intoxication, sobriety, and potent memories of a woman in a yellow sundress. But, it's also a story about love that asks what it means to finally feel, after years of feeling nothing but numb.

The story begins with a crash, and throughout the story, we bear witness to many more — both literal and metaphorical — as cars wrap around lamp posts and jump medians, and as the humans inside them are unknotted from smouldering metal and the entanglements of their choices.

"He" is a nameless, indiscriminate addict. A fuck-up without a driver's license, who has caused forty-two car crashes in eight years, and makes his living by picking through the shattered belongings and lives he leaves behind. "She" is Lola, and Lola is unsure where she's going, just that it's far from there.


MOUTHFULS OF SPACE

The poems in *Mouthfuls of Space* offer a dissociative journey through the life of a once homeless recovering drug addict and victim of childhood sexual, emotional, and physical abuse. Tom Prime's debut solo collection was written under the haze of antipsychotics later discovered to have caused many of his symptoms. His hypnotic, surreal voice reveals his transition from the street into the low-paying menial labour of factory work. There is beauty here too, and deeply dark comedy: a sprite-like being imagines his hallucinations as a deeper reality, where indescribable creatures coexist with "hyenas dressed as real estate agents" and those who march in "the skeleton parade."




ALL THE BROKEN THINGS



The visceral miniatures that comprise Lillian Necakov's sixth collection are spare and fleeting, but each is jam-packed with explosives: anger, grief, love, need, and a perpetual foraging for ink.

Scofflaw is a long poem, a playful exploration of Indigenous-Settler relations amid globalized pressures. For the most part, the poem is a lyrical dialectic flowing between a shadowy figure known as Scofflaw and an enigmatic "we." The content ranges from the effect of pesticides on Manitoba butter- flies to the reworking of a John Newlove poem on Indigenous peoples to Native remains beneath the Canadian Museum for Human Rights. The text culminates in a "lexicon standoff," where Scofflaw uses metaphysical means to avoid a character assassination, battling against the culling of words from the language.







tion of the effects of exile, internment, and dispersal on the third-generation of Japanese Canadians.


